### A STUDEBAKER STORY OF LOVE AND LECACY

This is the story told to Auto Journalist A. J. Baime, by a retired construction worker, Alec Childress, about how he acquired a 1939 Studebaker Champion as a gift from a young man, Jay Powers, that he mentored many years ago. It started back in 1962 when he met Jay as a young man who had lost his way after the death of both his father and mother and started to mentor him.

An informal adoption, led to Jay being an important person in Alec's life and Alec a part of Jay's. Alec espoused the motto "Love conquers all" as a guideline.

When Jay was old enough Alec rode motorcycles with him. One of Jay's treasured statements was; "Pops, I come to your house and watch every move you make, and try to be like you."

In 1980, Jay was living in Iowa then and told Alec "he found a Studebaker that was built the year you were born." Jay bought it and restored the interior and swapped a small-block Chevy V-8 in place of the small 6-cylinder L-head straight six. He also added modern alloy wheels, before he gave it to Alec.



Alec was touch by Jay's gift and his respect for how much Alec loved cars.

Alec related that he grew up in Mississippi where neither his father or mother ever owned a car. He tells of how he got a job after graduating from high school in 1957 allowing him to purchase a 1955 Ford. That started his life as a 'Car Guy'. He has owned Cadillacs, Corvettes and Harley-Davidsons during the past 30 years, but the Studebaker holds a special meaning for him. He relishes the long history of Studebaker,

that started as a 19th century blacksmith shop and how they went from building wagons, then cars up to the mid '60s when they went out of business.

About 16 years ago Jay lost his life in a severe motorcycle accident. Alec has since kept the Studebaker Champion just as it was when Jay gave it to him, and treasures the memories of his years of mentoring. Alec takes the Studebaker to shows frequently and as a volunteer school crossing guard, he often parks it near the corner where he helps school kids cross the street. He enjoys seeing the reaction of the kids (and adults) when they see his 1939 Studebaker Champion.



### ONLINE COMMUNITIES THAT ACTUALLY WORK

Editor's Note; I often clip articles out of newspapers that have some connection to the NCKCC. This one doesn't have a date, so I don't know where or when I got it. Are there any digital communities that aren't plagued by trolling, posturing and terrible behavior? Sure there are. In fact, there are quite a lot of online hubs where strangers talk all day long in a very civil fashion. But, these aren't the sites that we typically think of as social media, like Twitter, Facebook or YouTube. No, I'm thinking of the countless discussion boards and Discord servers devoted to hobbies or passions like fly fishing, cruise, art, long distance cycling or niche video-games.

I visit places like this pretty often in reporting on how people use digital tools, and whenever I check one out, I'm often struck by how un-toxic they are. These days, we wonder a lot about why social networks go bad. But it's equally illuminating to ask about the ones that work well. These communities share one characteristic: They're small. Generally they have only a few hundred members, or maybe a couple thousand if they are really popular.

And smallness makes all the difference. First, these groups have a sense of cohesion. The members have joined specifically to talk to people with whom they share an enthusiasm. That creates a type of social glue, a context and a mutual respect that can't exist on a highly public site like Twitter, where anyone can crash any public conversation.

More important, small groups typically have people who work to keep interactions civil. Sometimes this will be the forum organizer or an active, long-term participant. They'll greet newcomers to make them feel welcome, draw out quiet people and defuse conflict when they see it emerge. Sometimes they'll ban serious trolls. But what's crucial is that these key members model good behavior, illustrating by example the community's best standards. The internet thinkers Heather Gold, Kevin Marks and Deb schultz put a name to this: "tummeling," after the Yiddish ""tummerer," who keeps the party going.

None of these positive elements can exist in a massive, public social network, where millions of people can barge into each other's spaces – as they do on Twitter, Facebook and YouTube. That's why perhaps the biggest problem facing social media is that our dominant networks are obsessed with scale. They want to utterly dominate their fields, so they can kill or absorb rivals and have the ad dollars to themselves. But scale breaks social relations.

Is there any way to mitigate this problem? I've never heard of any simple solution. Strong antitrust enforcement for the big networks would be useful, to encourage a greater array of rivals that truly compete with one another. But this likely wouldn't fully solve the problem of scale, since many users crave scale too. Lusting after a massive, global audience, they will flock to whichever site offers the hugest size. Many of the proposed remedies for social media, like increased moderation or modifications to legal liability, might help, but all leave intact the biggest problem of all: Bigness itself.
