USS HORNET CV-12 VISIT

A group of seven NCKCC members and guests toured the USS Hornet Air & Space Museum in Alameda on April 23, 2022. It was a pleasure to be able to get out as a group after an extended delay due to the COVID 19 pandemic.

Our groups got separated early on, due to a difference in arrival times, and were not able to connect during our exploration of the large ship. We connected later by phone and exchanged some photos to prove we were all there at the same time.

HORNET HISTORY

The USS Hornet CV-12 is actually the eighth Navy ship with the same name and covered history from 1775 to 1970. In WW-II the seventh USS Hornet CV-8 was commissioned in 1941 just weeks before Pearl Harbor and was sunk during the Battle of the Santa Cruz Islands in late October 1942. The CV-8 is remembered for launching the large Doolittle B-25 bombers that raided Tokyo on April 18 1942.

The eighth *Hornet* was an Essex-class aircraft carrier. USS *Hornet* (CV-12) was commissioned in November 1943.

She entered the Pacific War in March 1944 and was part of the famous US Navy Fast Carrier Task Forces that pounded enemy installations in the western Pacific and supported numerous island

invasions. She was awarded 11 battle stars for her exemplary WW-II service. She also served three tours of duty in the Vietnam War and recovered the Apollo 11 and Apollo 12 lunar landing spaceflights in 1969.


The heart of a carrier's combat strength is its aircraft. Hornet's success was dependent on the capabilities of highly trained pilots and aircrews and the specialized aircraft that operated from her flight deck.

In World War II, her air groups consisted of a fighter (VF) squadron, a bombing (VB) squadron and a torpedo (VT) squadron.

During the 1950s as naval warfare technology evolved, so too did the complexity and specialty of carrier-based aircraft. Joining the classic fighter and attack aircraft were electronic/early warning, photoreconnaissance, and anti-submarine warfare aircraft. Dual-role aircraft also provided aerial tanking and limited cargo capabilities. Also, helicopters proved essential to carrier operations which included search and rescue missions.

FACTORY FIVE 818 PROJECT

This is a summary of a story published by automotive writer Mike Jordan in the WSJ.

Michael Lanfreschi started auto-crossing his Corvette in 2009, but soon wanted to get into competitive racing, but found it hard to fit into his budget. After some research he discovered the FFR 818 kit that was designed to use a Subaru WRX as a donor car. The kit cost about \$11,000 in 2017 and he was able to find an older Subaru for about \$3,500. He estimated he could finish it for a total cost of \$22,000 and be able to maintain it for a lot less dollars than a more exotic race car.

He found the assembly and mechanical challenges more difficult than he expected but was fortunate to have a brother who was a master mechanic for Audi, VW and Porsche and gave him credit for his critical consulting work. He also gave credit to the Factory Five Forum, where there is a wealth of knowledge and a willingness to share it.

From the story, it appears that it took more than a year to complete the car. It will be registered as a street vehicle, but he expects to drive it to the race track and back home after racing. That sounds like an ideal objective, but needs to be backed up by a "Plan-B" in case the unexpected occurs.
