After being rained out on our planned Sunday September 18th date we regrouped and were able to get a new date and the show went on. We had 17 cars on display which included our club member cars and an amazing selection of rare classic cars from the '30s to '70s.

We wish to thank all of you that displayed your cars. Special thanks to Eddie Togonon, who did a great job bringing a beautiful array of vintage U.S. Classics. A pictorial tribute to the Show Cars follows.



Charles Grima has created a very special 1955 Chevrolet 210 Wagon. It's called Shorty by reason of the 91" wheelbase. Has a hot 350 CID V-8 under the hood and the flame paint scheme is dazzling.



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Mark Rubenstein brought his Factory-built replica of 1939 Mercedes-Benz four seat roadster. It's powered by a '71 Ford 302 engine with an auto tranny.



Sherman Mah built this Factory Five Cobra replica, powered by a Ford 302 V-8.



This is Dave Zunino's '57 Porsche Speedster replica. It's powered by a 1.6 L air-cooled flat-four engine.



Danny Chappa owns this 1954 Chevrolet Wagon with all the vintage trim of the 50's. It has a straight 6 236 CID Chevy under the hood, but I've seen some photos that show it can pull a ski boat.



This is Ed Howland's 1948 Ford Coupe. Specs were not available, but the white over maroon paint scheme and the frenched lights make it a rare sight.



This 1950 Ford Pick-up was one of the first F-Series trucks that are still popular. It's owners are Chuck & Judy Murch. The 302 engine suggests a modest update in the power department.



Jim Jordan owns this newly restored 1965 Sunbeam Tiger, powered by a 302 Ford V-8 with a 5-speed tremec tranny.



This is a replica of a 1934 Mercedes Benz 500K Roadster. It is owned by Chuck Maddux and has a Chev 350 engine and auto tranny under the hood.



This '56 Ford F-100 was shown by Dennis Ferreira. It is in showroom or better condition, but sports a 350 CID V-8 under the hood.



This 1941 Ford belongs to Frank Fernandes and is powered by a 2.4 liter Toyota. Someone told me it has a Toyota frame and running gear under that beautiful green body.



Jim Wagner built this car from a 1986 Pontiac Fiero by replacing body panels to turn it into a Corvette lookalike. A mid-engine V-6 provides the power.



This silver '76 Chenille belongs to Jeff Lowe. Not much on specs was available, but it was a visual treat.



Lee Leder owns this beautiful 1946 Lincoln Continental. It has an original flathead V-12 under the hood and it's as pretty as the rest of the car.





Al Hoesner owns this steel bodied 1931 Ford Model A 2-dr sedan. it's powered by a 283 V-8 and has a 350 auto tranny.



In 1971 Automotive Entrepreneur Malcolm Bricklin decided America needed a revolutionary sports-safety car. Three years and \$20 million later, he gave it to them.

Steve Rhodes brought his modified Bricklin SV1 to our show. About 1,500 of the 2850 factory-built cars are still around.



Jerry Liberty brought his 1970 Pontic Grand Prix. This light green jewel has a Pontiac 400 CID engine.



This is Eddie Togonon's 1956 Ford Victoria, powered by a 302 V-8. The color scheme is Cream over Peacock Blue.
